We are pleased to share with you the 2021 Annual Report of the Heart of New England Council. Thanks to the collective efforts of the thousands of committed volunteers, parents, donors and our staff, 2021 was an exceptional year for Scouting in Central Massachusetts!

There were many successes during the year; we saw 135 Scouts earn the rank of Eagle, and we celebrated our first female Eagle Scouts. Over 5,000 merit badges were earned during the year, and nearly 30,000 hours of volunteer service were invested in our local communities. We welcomed more than 600 new youth into our program in 2021, and we relocated our Council Service Center to Rutland.

Camp Wanocksett and Treasure Valley Scout Reservation both came roaring back to life after being dormant in 2020 due to the COVID pandemic. More than 2,300 youth enjoyed the outdoor experience of summer camp. The sounds of Scouts having fun at camp was wonderful to experience again!

We would like to thank all our donors and benefactors who continue to invest in the Scouting movement and in the Heart of New England Council. We are grateful for the more than 1,900 registered adult volunteers who work with the nearly 4,000 Scouts in the Heart of New England Council. Week in and week out, these leaders provide an amazing example as they tirelessly help young people develop into the future leaders of our country. Scouting continues to provide one of the best youth-serving programs in the country, and it only happens because of the passion, unwavering support, and belief of our dedicated volunteers.

96 Scouts participated in two National Youth Leadership Training courses in 2021. More than 20 youth further honed their skills while serving as instructors for the courses.


NATIONALLY

Treasure Valley Scout Reservation and Camp Wanocksett are recognized leaders in providing safe, high-quality summer camp adventures for Scouts.

The young adults who comprise the bulk of our summer camp staff are the product of our programs. With a focus on customer service, and attention to detail, and a committment to our Mission, these young men and women return year-after-year to help provide first-class opportunities to the next generation of Scouting youth.

The dedicated volunteers of our properties committees, with support from our growing base of camp alumni, assist our camp rangers with routine maintenance and upkeep, support the physical plant needs of our summer camp programs, and help guide camp improvement projects throughout the year.

After being closed for most of 2020, thanks to the hard work of volunteers, and our summer camp, and fulltime staffs, Heart of New England Council was able to safely welcome Scouts back to Camp Wanocksett and Treasure Valley Scout Reservation in 2021. Including summer camp and year-round camping, 260 Scouting units and more than 5000 visitors spent time at our camps this year.
