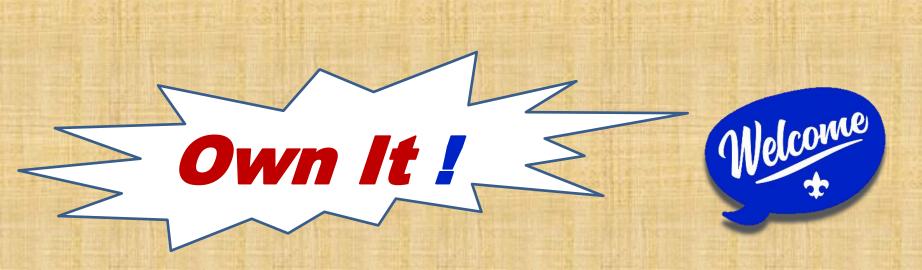












Create a sense of OWNERSHIP to build SUCCESS

Should strongly consider to include Tracking / Monitoring.....

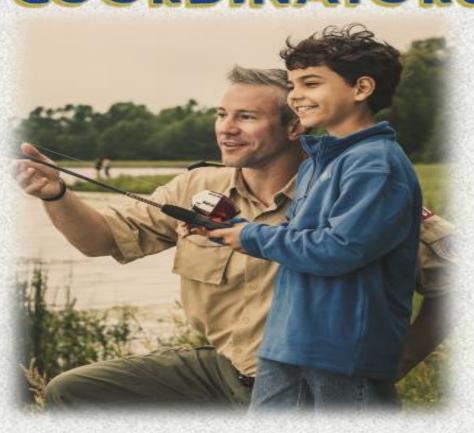

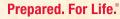

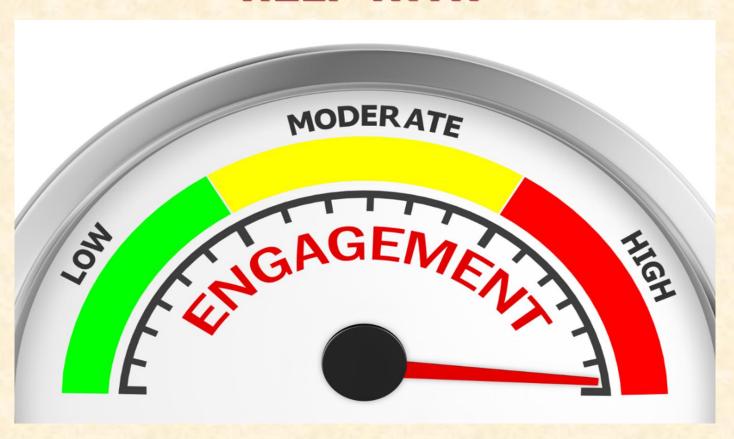

Welcoming / Onboarding Best Practices

- Be that friendly face
 - Continue close contact
 - Let families know you are there for them and they can count on you
 - Thank them for coming
- You do not need to know all the answers but promptly follow-up or direct them to those who could answer that question or concern
- Make a "top 5" list of things a new youth and their family would need to know
 - Don't overthink it!!!!!
 - Have your contact information available
 - Ensure you have the contact information of all your new families
 - Have your unit calendar available
 - Control that flow of information and watch the use of Scouting Jargon

Welcoming / Onboarding Best Practices



- Ask yourself, "How is your unit leadership's awareness and your meeting location accommodations for those with disabilities?"
- Follow-up and monitor new Scouts and their families
 - Do they attend outings, den meetings and Pack Night?
 - Is their child advancing?
 - Bobcat or Scout Rank can be earned within 1 month
- Should always be alert to new youth and their families who join throughout the year

How to involve new Parents

- <u>"Actively Listen"</u> to your new families during your conversations to learn their "passion", concerns, and availability
- Start small
 - Do not be that "Bull in the China Shop"
 - Ask a family to bring treats
 - Engage them in an activity...the key is to make it interactive
 - Judge a Pinewood Derby Race
 - Assist with a unit event
 - Not to be that chair / lead
- Utilize the Family Talent Survey
 - See next slide

Why a Family Leaves Scouting.....

TOP 5 REASONS FOR LEAVING

	Cub Scout Parents	Scouts BSA Parents
Unit had poor leadership/problems with leaders	31%	26%
Our family did not feel welcome	20%	17%
Child is no longer interested in the program	18%	32%
Too expensive	16%	18%
Lack of communication from leaders	15%	3%







WHERE TO BEGIN

- Q. How do we engage and retain the youth and their families?
 - o A: Cultivate an inclusive and welcoming culture for all.
 - Ensure everyone has a voice and is listened to.
 - Engage everyone in providing responsibilities.
 - Assign a "buddy" for new Scouts.
 - LISTEN and learn.
 - Hold feedback sessions (or survey for input if necessary).
 - Identify what's working effectively and where opportunities lie.
 - Empower youth and volunteers to problem-solve.
